






How Ohio Population Compares

Ohio's growth rate is less than other states.

Only 5 Ohio counties have grown greater than the rate of growth nationally.

58 counties have lost more population than the U.S. average.

- Eligibility for funding for an organization or individuals
- Computation formulas based on how many people live in an area
- Project applications are prioritized
- Interest rates for loan programs area set based on geographic data.

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






The Findlay Story
