American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

- The [American Rescue Plan Act](#) (ARPA) of 2021 designates \$200 million in pandemic response funding for the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). The \$200 million investment will provide critical funding to State Library Administrative Agencies (SLAAs), located in every U.S. state and territory, with reach into local communities across the country. In Ohio, the State Library of Ohio will receive \$4,547,789 in one-time federal ARPA funds through the [IMLS Grants to States](#) program. Once disbursed, the funds will need to be utilized by June 30, 2022.
- The State Library of Ohio will use the majority of ARPA funds to provide substantial support to statewide and regional programs directly impacted by the pandemic, including resource sharing and e-content usage. In addition to that support, to best leverage these funds, the State Library will announce opportunities for competitive grants in May. The State Library is investing a significant amount of thought, creativity, and preparation to develop an equitable plan to reach academic, public, school, and special libraries. Libraries of all types adapted to the changing needs of their communities throughout the past year, and each type of library faced different challenges with a common thread of bridging the digital divide. Choose to Read Ohio

- Floyd's Pick Book Award
 - **Hello** by Aiko Ikegami (Creston Books, 2019) has been named the sixth annual Floyd's Pick Book Award winner in memory of children's literature expert, advocate, and librarian Floyd Dickman.
 - The Floyd's Pick Book Award is given annually to a book written by an Ohio author or illustrated by an Ohio illustrator that is representative of high-quality literature created for children. It is given to carry on the legacy of Floyd Dickman's work to support and share children's literature. The Choose to Read Ohio (CTRO) Advisory Council established Floyd's Pick in December 2015 and selects the annual winner and honor books.

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- The CTRO Advisory Council has also selected three Floyd's Pick Honor Books for 2021: ***The Arabic Quill*** by Aya Khalil, illustrated by Anait Semirdzhyan (Tilbury House Publishers, 2020); ***Go, Girls, Go!*** by Frances Gilbert, illustrated by Alison Black (Beach Lane Books / Simon & Schuster, 2019); and ***The Oldest Student: How Mary Walker Learned to Read*** by Rita Lorraine Hubbard, illustrated by Oge Mora (Schwartz & Wade / Penguin Random House, 2020).

- The 2021 & 2022 Choose to Read Ohio (CTRO) program cycle officially kicked off in January. The [2021 & 2022 CTRO booklist](#) features 20 notable titles for all ages and reading levels. The booklist includes five books each for young children, middle grades, teens, and adults, and encompasses fiction and nonfiction and a variety of geographic and cultural interests. Ohio librarians, teachers, and other book experts help to select the biennial CTRO booklist.

- The State Library of Ohio has resumed lending materials. **Items will be available via contact-free front door pickup at the State Library on Wednesdays and Thursdays from 10 a.m. – 4 p.m.** The address for the State Library of Ohio is 274 E. 1st Avenue, Suite 100, Columbus, OH 43201.
 - How contact-free front door pickup works:
 - Have your library card number ready.
 - Look for the contact-free front door pickup signs posted in the parking lot and on the library door. Call the number posted on the signs: 614-560-1646.
 - Deaf or hard of hearing patrons, please text 614-560-1646.
 - Staff answering the phone will check out your items and place them inside the vestibule on the table.
 - You must wear a face covering to pick up your items inside the vestibule.
 - You will enter the vestibule and pick up your items on the table. Your items will be in a plastic bag.

- Our reference and cataloging librarians are working remotely, [responding to reference requests](#) from state employees and the general public alike. With an eye toward the future, staff are also cataloging and archiving state agency web publications regarding COVID-19.

Guiding Ohio Online

- Applications are now being accepted for public libraries to host a Guiding Ohio Online Technology Trainer. NASA@ My Library

- The State Library of Ohio was chosen to participate in a NASA@ My Library Advisory Panel. The panel will discuss how to best share NASA@ My Library materials with libraries across the United States, and what support libraries might need for STEM Programming. Penelope Shumaker will represent the State Library of Ohio on the panel.

Ohio Digital Library

- In the month of April, ODL tallied 589,396 checkouts.
 - Curious about what's being checked out? Take a look at [the real-time checkouts and holds](#).
- In mid-March 2020, ODL enabled the opportunity for Ohioans to take advantage of the Overdrive [Instant Digital Card](#). A user can sign up with their phone number and gain quick access to e-content via ODL. Users that sign up via the Instant Digital Card will be directed to their local library to fill out a physical library card. In April 2021, 4,056 registrations took place.

Ohio Digital Network [Digital Public Library of America (DPLA) Project]

- Through April, the Ohio Digital Network (ODN) now has over [250,000 items](#) on dp.la. from 25 active contributors.
- In partnership with OPLIN, ODN awards the Ohio Digitized Archives Researcher Award at [Ohio History Day](#). The award recognizes one outstanding junior and one outstanding senior Ohio History Day project demonstrating effective use of digitized resources created by Ohio's cultural heritage institutions—public libraries, educational institutions, museums and historical societies—made available through the Ohio Digital Network or an institution's own website. The project should demonstrate that the researcher has developed their own questions and ideas about their topic, has expanded the variety of resources they consult, has evaluated those sources for usefulness and bias, and has applied them to their research questions with sufficient citation for others to find those sources again. This year the award winners were:

Ohio Ready to Read

- The Ohio Ready to Read (ORTR) trainers have developed an online version of the popular [Early Literacy 101 workshop](#). Open-registration workshops will be announced on the Library Youth Services listserv and the [ORTR Facebook page](#). By-request workshops for 15-20 participants are possible; see the [ORTR website](#) for details.
- Early Literacy 101 is a free, hands-on workshop to help library staff build a firm foundation in early literacy. The online workshop includes two two-hour live sessions and approximately 2 hours of on-your-own work. Participants will learn how brain development impacts how young children learn, and will explore effective, research-based early literacy resources and activities.

Summer Food Service Program

- Many libraries in Ohio and around the USA participate in the **Summer Food Service Program** (SFSP), a USDA-funded program that provides free meals and snacks to children ages 0-18 in communities with high levels of need. Besides the obvious benefits of addressing hunger and supporting vulnerable youth, SFSP participation benefits libraries through:
 - Access to new user groups, especially underserved and marginalized populations;
 - Increased visibility of the library as a community asset;
 - Opportunities for new partnerships;
 - Positioning of the library as an important stakeholder in community well-being and positive child outcomes;
 - Support for summer library programming through increased attendance.
- If you are already an SFSP site or have been in the past, work with your current/previous sponsor to prepare for summer 2021. Current USDA waivers allowing for non-congregate meal distribution (grab & go) and relaxing area eligibility are in effect through September 30 for SFSP.
- If you want to become an SFSP site, the Collaborative Summer Library Program offers a thorough and clear how-to guide for libraries: [Libraries and Summer Food](#) provides a step-by-step for libraries interested in becoming SFSP sites, or otherwise getting involved in addressing child food insecurity during the summer.
- The [Children's Hunger Alliance](#) can serve as an SFSP sponsor for eligible sites in all 88 Ohio counties for distribution of shelf-stable meals and snacks that meet nutrition guidelines. You may also consider completing the [Ohio Department of Education's Potential Sponsor Survey](#). The ODE administers the SFSP statewide and identifies new sponsors and sites through this survey.

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Summer Library Program/Summer Reading Program

- 2021 statewide incentives are available from [Ohio State Parks](#) (\$10 off an overnight stay) and the [Ohio Renaissance Festival](#) (½ off gate admission). Any Ohio public library may, at its discretion, distribute these coupon incentives to SLP participants of any age. Instructions for obtaining the coupons have been posted to Ohio library listservs including [Library Youth Services](#), [OPLINlist](#), and [SmLibs](#). Please contact Janet Ingraham Dwyer at jdwyer@library.ohio.gov if you work at a public library and need the download links and instructions.
- An online access code for the 2021 Collaborative Summer Library Program manual was sent to a representative of each of Ohio's 251 public library systems in the fall. The access code may be used by all library buildings and departments in multi-location systems. Ohio public libraries' membership in CSLP and access to the online CSLP manual are fully supported by federal LSTA funds administered by the State Library of Ohio. The online manual includes the complete program manual, all artwork and downloadables, and many extra resources not available in the static manual formats.
- The 2021 CSLP slogan is "Tails and Tales." The program features animal-themed artwork by [Salina Yoon](#).

Transforming Teen Services

- The Young Adult Library Services Association (YALSA) is leading a nationwide training initiative to support and elevate teen services in libraries and other learning environments. Transforming Teen Services integrates connected learning, computational thinking, and youth development to help librarians build responsive services for and with teens. A national cohort includes teams of trainers from 46 states; Washington, DC; and the Northern Mariana Islands. Ohio's training team includes Kristin Wilson, Mansfield/Richland County Public Library; Steve Moser, Dayton Metro Library; and Janet Ingraham Dwyer, State Library of Ohio.
- Registration is open for a special interactive webinar for library directors and administrators. [Impacting Lives One Teen at a Time: What Directors Should Know](#) is a high-level overview of this initiative introducing key topics in contemporary teen services. It will take place on Wednesday, May 12 at 10:00 am.
- After planned trainings across Ohio were interrupted by the public health emergency, Ohio's team developed a four-session, six-hour online Transforming Teen Services course.
